The History of Sunset Lake

The Friends of Bridgewater History (FoBH) will present "The History of Sunset Lake" at the Bridgewater Municipal building at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday October 22, 2025.

Sunset Lake was the brainchild of Dr Rudolf "Doc" Meiners and his wife, Alice, after they purchased the Hoffman Farm in 1921. After living in the old farmhouse for several years, they envisioned creating a resort community revolving around a yet-to-be-created man-made lake.

Lane/Voorhees/Brokaw House Welcomed Many "Journey Through the Past" Visitors

On Saturday, October 11th, the Friends of Bridgewater History participated in the Somerset County Cultural and Heritage Commission's annual event, Journey Through the Past, at the historic Lane/Voorhees/Brokaw house on Milltown Road in Bridgewater. The house is owned by Bridgewater Township, and FOBH is working with the township to restore the home to its former glory.



Although the weather did not cooperate, there was a steady stream of visitors to the site all day. The highlight of the day was the demonstration about how the early settlers



used plants to dye fabrics and create textiles. The demo was given by Stephanie Moench, Bridgewater Creative Arts Committee Chair. (photos, above and right.)

The Lane/Voorhees/Brokaw house was built circa 1750 by William Lane. A fire destroyed much of the house in 1837, but the shell of the house remained, because it was made of brick. Court Voorhees rebuilt the interior of the house following the fire.

There are three sections of house: the brick portion, built in the mid-1700s; the shed section likely built after 1837; and the addition on the west end of the house, built in the mid-1900s.

framing in the brick portion of the house dates back to post-1837. The sloping roof of the house is typical of Dutch-American homes built during the mid-1700s.

Over the next several years they pieced together several adjacent land parcels totaling ~ 250 acres. The property contained the narrow valley where Chambers Brook flowed. The land was cleared; roads were cut through the mountainous section and laid in the northern flatter section and a 550' dam of ~ 30 ' peak height was constructed, creating a spillway for the lake.

The land was parceled into ½-acre lots with deed restrictions stating that all lots around the newly formed lake were to be sold at no less than \$3000 (other lots were fully negotiable). Water was included via above ground pipes and a wooden water tower

The Lane/Voorhees/Brokaw house is listed on the State Register of Historic Places. It is a classic example of a pre-Revolutionary Dutch house. The floor plan is known as a double-pile, center hall plan. The house has a coursed rubble stone foundation with brick walls. The pattern of the brickwork is called Flemish bond.

The house is surrounded by preserved Open Space land. It is located along the North Branch of the Raritan River on the edge of the first terrace above the river's flood plain.

During the Revolutionary War, John Brokaw lost his life serving his country at the Battle of Germantown. Undocumented local tradition states that George Washington paid a condolence visit to Maria Brokaw at this house in the spring of 1779. Maria was the widow of John Brokaw, and she was William Lane's second wife.

If you missed visiting the Lane/Voorhees/Brokaw house this year, mark your calendar for next year's *Journey Through the Past* event on October 10-11. 2026.







There were hundreds of visitors to the booth, with a lot of interest expressed in the activities of each organization. Be sure to mark your calen-



Revolutionary War Grave Markers Preserved at William Lane Cemetery By Jan Rohn

Five Revolutionary War grave markers at the William Lane Cemetery in Bridgewater were recently

This summer, a lot of work has been going on in the cemetery and the grave marker of Rebecca Bertran (right) was recently unearthed. In the back row, there are three grave markers and then an opening where there is a flat piece. Now you can see a standing grave marker there.

The Lane-Voorhees-Brokaw House on Milltown Road was built by William Lane about 1750. The grounds (but not the house itself), was opened to the public during the weekend of the Somerset County Journey Through the Past on October 11-12.

The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution is a nonprofit, non-political volunteer women's service organization dedicated to promoting patriotism, preserving American history, and securing America's future through better education for children.

A dedication of the cemetery is tentatively planned for sometime in the future.

preserved thanks to an Historic Preservation Grant which the Friends of Bridgewater History received from the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). The matching funds needed to apply for the grant were raised through generous contributions from several members of the Friends of Bridgewater History. The grant was sponsored by the Middletown Chapter, NSDAR.

The grave markers of William Lane, his first wife Jannetje Rappalyea, their sons Gilbert and Tunis, and son-in-law Hendrick Vroom were in need of repair. The work was performed by Jablonski Building Conservation. Three grave markers that were lying on the ground and a gravestone that was leaning severely were reset. 




